A New Mission Statement

The Redevelopment Team has been working on a new Mission Statement for Northlake Lutheran for several months. We have looked carefully at God’s call to us. We also asked you to complete a questionnaire to help us understand the priorities, as you see them, of our congregation. We have taken all this information and created a new Mission Statement for the church. Which is:

We are created, called, and challenged to be in relationship with...

- God
- Each Other
- Community
- All of Creation

Part of our thinking is that we want a short statement. One that everyone in the congregation can remember. It is also our hope that this statement correctly reflects our calling. To embrace God, each other, our community and all the world including nature.

It may seem a little too short to some of you. Although not part of the Mission Statement we have written more information for each of these relationships and explained how we feel that we are called to them. Our idea is that the Mission Statement will be on our website. While reading the Mission Statement anyone will be able to click on each of the relationships (with God, Each Other, Community, or All of Creation) and be taken to a page, which offers an explanation of that relationship.

Again, the explanation although very thoughtful and biblically based is not part of the actual Mission Statement.

Last month, in honor of Mother's Day, we considered some beautiful mothering images and examples from Scripture. The images were varied; some highlighted the loving, nurturing nature of a woman, while others showed the strong, protective side.



This month, in honor of Father's Day, I went looking for fathering images and examples in Scripture. What I found, in [Jeremy Meyers' words](#),¹ is "a bunch of guys who doubt God's promises, sleep around with their servants, impregnate other men's wives, and have children who rebel." Let's face it, Scripture is not the best source for male role models.

At first, this put me off. But then I realized the bible has many more male stories than female, and so the stories give us a more complete picture of the men. This means we see the scandalous stories as well as the honorable ones.

As I took another look, I found stories worthy of holding high. Abram encourages Lot to take first pick of the lands they had shared so Lot may embark upon his own journey. Jacob faces up to his dishonest past when he humbly approaches his brother Esau. Esau warmly welcomes Jacob home, bringing instant forgiveness and love. Boaz loves and cares for Ruth, a woman who was a foreigner and had been married to his late cousin. Eli fathers a child that is not his own, teaching him, providing for him, and supporting him when he, Samuel, receives his own call from God. Joseph stands by Mary and parents a child he cannot claim for himself.

These men, despite their faults and shortcomings, carry glimpses of God within. They are not perfect, and yet, God loved them as God's own. This gives us hope. For as we recognize our own shortcomings, we see that these famous figures in Scripture are not so different from our selves. We realize that just as God loved them, God loves us. And just as God called them, God also calls us. Perhaps none of us is the perfect role model, but all of us model strong roles when we allow God to shine through.

And so, on this Father's Day, as we notice the varied and diverse fathers and father figures that surround us, we also recognize God within each one. For we realize that being a father not only means embracing the attributes we think of as "fatherly" (provider, protector, and source of strength), but also those that might not immediately come to mind (tender-hearted, nurturing, loving). This brings us a new and fresh perspective on what it means to be Father.

And so, for all you fathers out there, be you full of courage, power, nurturing, soft-heartedness, wisdom, support, or any of the other Godly shapes, sizes, and stories represented in Scripture... know this. We are grateful for you, and wish upon you a most spectacular Father's Day!

Recently we lost a longtime member of the Northlake congregation, Lorna Glastra. She bequeathed a significant sum to the church to be used for Christian education expenses, in honor of another deceased Northlake member, Marjorie Bly. Throughout her life, Marjorie had demonstrated the heart of a missionary, and emphasized the value and importance of Christian education. We are blessed to have the responsibility to use these monies to accomplish some of God's work in education.

It is now left to us to figure out how to administer this fund. The one certainty is that this will be kept separate from regular general operating funds for the church. Shortly we will be setting up a task force (not an ongoing committee) to determine our guidelines for the use of the funds. We will determine what kind of education will be supported, from youth to seminary, how much can be used per year, an application process, money management procedure, and a dozen other questions. My Dad– Al Boyett By Tahnya Boyett



Learning to Discern

Every parent knows what is right for their child. Right? Not always! Kim and I were quite certain we knew exactly which teacher our shy daughter Briana needed for first grade. It certainly wasn't the one that the school determined would be best. We worried ourselves over the fact that Mrs. Balka appeared to us to be so strict. How would our little one ever survive? She would be crushed and end up in a pool of tears.

Mrs. Balka ended up being just the right teacher for our Briana. Her high expectations and clear sense of order is precisely what Briana needed as she was trying to learn to navigate her world. Mrs. Balka had a wonderful capacity to see the giftedness of each child. She could see the teacher in Briana.

Briana started the year with her desk in an absolute mess. Her brain wasn't yet wired for good order. Kim went in every Friday at the request of the teacher to help her learn to order it so she got off the week to a good start. By the end of the year Briana, on her own, had a very neat desk.

Briana ended up turning her bedroom (with a little help from her mother) into a classroom. The ABCs adorned her walls and she managed to come up with a desk, overhead projector, and real classroom clock. She couldn't wait to get home from school so that she could begin playing school. Briana was printing off attendance sheets, worksheets, and grading sheets a plenty.

The truth is we were never quite sure whether Briana was doing her own homework or made up homework intended for her make-believe class. Fast forward 25 years and that same daughter has now been teaching for six years. This year Briana is teaching first grade. There may well be parents who fear their child will be enrolled in her classroom. After all who do you think our daughter has modeled her teaching after? You are right if you are thinking Mrs. Balka.

Briana is also Miss Organized. Everything has its rightful place. Everything is color-coded, three holed punched, and filed for quick access. We learned an important lesson by not interfering in Briana being assigned to Mrs. Balka's class. We learned the importance of not allowing our own fears and prejudices to determine what might be life giving.

We call this the act of discernment in the Living Local Movement. Discernment comes only after dwelling in God's word. It comes after deep listening and beginning to see what one may not see on first impression. At first we didn't see how much Briana would gain from having a teacher with clear expectations and a helpful sense of order. We only saw "strict."

This same reality is often what prevents a congregation from seeing what God might be up to in the neighborhood. We tend to think we know who our church is and what it is we need. This can prevent us from responding to invitations that the community may be trying to extend to us. We have a tendency to get stuck in "our" ways when God might be inviting us into God's way. There is no doubt in my mind that God is enrolling the church in a new classroom that none of us are too sure is the right classroom for us. Rather than fearing these new times, perhaps we ought to see the gifts that God has in store for us.

The pipe organ planning continues.

As you will remember, at a special congregational meeting in February, the congregation voted to move forward with the purchase of a pipe organ. Carl Dodrill from the Organ Foundation presented a plan for a smaller portable unit, for which our current funds would be sufficient.

A team of Northlake members has been meeting with Carl to make plans for the placement of the organ. A mock-up was made that gives the approximate size of the pipe cabinet (s), and this was placed in various locations to give the congregation a clearer picture of possibilities. A questionnaire gave members the chance to voice their opinions about this. The results of that questionnaire informed us that many members felt the proposed placements at the front of the sanctuary made the space too crowded and distracted from the cross and the table. We heard this feedback and went back to the drawing board to consider other options.

In discussions with Carl at its most recent meeting, the Team came up with new ideas which Carl endorsed as being doable in constructing the organ. The mock-up was moved to the choir loft area, and Carl offered ideas on using one cabinet (instead of two) which would include some external pipes. Placement in the loft takes some unused space and re-purposes it for a current need.

The Team also felt that placement there was less obtrusive than other options and visually more pleasing, in general. Carl is in the process of drawing up a new plan which will include placement of the visible cabinet/pipes as well as the unseen components. As always, the congregation will be given the opportunity for input before final decisions are made.

The full Team consists of Ken Musgrave, John Rowland, Jim Poland, Pastor Anja, Nancy Martin, Roland Lindstrom and Jeanie McBee. Special thanks to Ken for constructing the mock-up unit that has been so helpful in visualizing space requirements.



Pastor Pribbernow Talks RIC at Northlake

On May 7th Northlake hosted Pastor Rick Pribbernow who leads the synod's Open Door Ministries. The RIC group invited him to deliver a temple talk, sermon and lead a lunchtime (and what a lunch it was!) forum. At least 25 people attended as part of the congregation's discernment process as we approach an October vote to become a Reconciling in Christ congregation that actively welcomes the LGBT community to worship with us.

During the forum Pastor Rick walked us down the amazing march towards LGBT rights over the last 50 years and the many symbols of that struggle. There were many symbols and key events but one that I had never heard is the Nazis gathered not only Jews but Gypsies and gays, people they considered undesirable, into concentration camps. They identified each group with unique badges. Gays were required to wear pink triangles. By the end of the '70s the symbol was co-opted and inverted. It is now a symbol of the suffering experienced and the strength of the gay rights movement.

What struck me most was Pastor Pribbernow's answer to the response to the question,; Why do we need RIC and an affirmation statement since we already welcome everyone? He essentially responded that many LGBTQ people have felt judged by Christians. Many of these people won't hear our welcome unless we express it actively. I thought what a shame if someone was looking for a loving welcoming community such as Northlake, but they passed us by because we didn't raise our voices in welcome.

Chuck's House

A Northlake Ministry that many were not aware of

At a congregational meeting in 1998, it was decided to purchase a home with the idea of providing a place to house individuals with developmental disabilities. As a result of that vote, a Kenmore home was purchased in 1999. The home was given the name of "Chuck's House" in memory of a former member who died before he could see his dream come true.

A little bit about Chuck Brenchley: He and his wife Dot, along with their family, were long-time members at Northlake (Dot is still a member) and were very active in the congregation. The reason for Chuck's dream was their involvement in the state program for the disabled. Their son is still a resident at the Fircrest facility in Shoreline. Chuck wanted to help provide living facilities in communities for those able to function in this type of setting.

When the home was purchased, it was then leased to a non-profit organization that manages several homes by providing on site caretakers for the residents. The mortgage has been paid down significantly and we are now able to route a sum of money to our Chuck's House Reserve Fund, being saved to handle any unexpected repair expenses. This and all other expenses for Chuck's House, are maintained entirely separately from Northlake's general budget and funding.

Over the years, the Northlake congregation has shrunk and members have aged, leaving us less able to have working parties at Chuck's House to deal with routine maintenance and cleanup tasks. Overall, the Northlake members who are still aware of this ministry are very proud of the facility we have provided for the past seventeen years.

At this time, the family of one of the residents has expressed concern that Northlake would fade in the interest or ability to continue to host Chuck's House. They have expressed an interest in buying Chuck's House. Northlake now needs to assess the condition of the house and to determine whether any maintenance is called for. After we develop a good strong understanding of the current state and expectations for the future, the matter will be presented to the congregation for a vote.

We are looking for a person to perform this one time assessment. Foodbank Update

The volunteers at the foodbank would like to thank everyone who provides ongoing support with donations to our foodbank here at Northlake and to tell about the program for those who are not familiar with the ongoing ministry.

Our foodbank is a distribution point for Hopelink Food Bank, the organization that supplies us with the bulk of our supplies. We distribute food from 4:30 to 6:30 every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month. In addition to the items that we have in storage here, Hopelink brings fresh fruit, vegetables, meat, dairy products and bakery items on each distribution day.

The people who come to the foodbank are registered with Hopelink which has an income level based on family size and everyone is a resident of our Kenmore area. The people who come range from young families to senior citizens.

One of the things that the volunteers do when sorting donated supplies is to check each item for expiration dates and throw out outdated items. Hopelink has guidelines for what can be distributed (only canned food can be over by 1 year), so please check your donations before delivering them. Thank you again, and keep those donations coming.


